***City Deal consultations***

Please keep your eyes open for any developing news either through the Cambridge News or the Cambridge Independent or the City Deal website <http://www.gccitydeal.co.uk> Barton Councillors have continued to be involved with discussions.

***Cambourne to Cambridge & Western Orbital***

The Local Liaison Forum, a body with representatives at County, City, District and Parish levels, met on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> February. The purpose of the meeting was 'To discuss and adopt a clear position on Option 6'. The options are:

**Option 3/3a – New roads, wide busways, through Coton Orchard etc. Cost ~£141m;**

**Option 6 – using existing roads, tidal bus segregation on Madingley Rise. Cost less than ¼ option 3/3a @ £32m).** Buses to hub at Cambridge West site.

Bev Edwards gave an excellent presentation with an overview of Cambridge going into the future. By 2031, 44,000 new jobs, 65,000 more people, 33,500 more homes, 25,000 more trips into Cambridge (info from City Deal). His point was that the City Deal should not be looking at the Cambourne-Cambridge route in isolation.

A general feeling at the meeting was that officers were using a sledgehammer to crack a nut. The short term should focus on small-scale interventions to make bus travel and cycling attractive and viable for many more people. It is thought that

Route 3/3a is only ~2 mins faster than Option 6.

There is a continuing campaign to scrap the P&R charge. It must also be remembered that people are not all going to central Cambridge.

Smarter Cambridge Transport – stressed the importance of developing the Girton Interchange; those attending showed no support for building major infrastructure which would undermine the Girton Interchange project.

No working group was set up – until the details on Option 6 were clearer.

There will be a follow-up meeting on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> March.

### ***Coalition of Parish Councils***

This met on 9<sup>th</sup> January 2017. The Coalition now has 20 members and is still growing. Its purpose has now been changed, so that it will focus on key strategic transport and planning issues affecting our communities. Some survey work in Cambourne has proved that commuters wanted to use cars because they were so much more versatile. James Palmer, mayoral candidate, will be invited to talk to a future meeting.

### **Barton Wildlife Group**



By the time you read this, the newly formed Barton Wildlife Group will have held five events, pond dipping, a bramble ramble, wildlife in the garden, a winter bird walk and a wander round Church Close, and we have more events planned for the year ahead. Instigated by some members of the Parish Council, we are a local group of wildlife enthusiasts, with no specific affiliation, and we are trying to record the wildlife in the village to illustrate what a special place it is. We aim to organize an event for all ages, each ½ term and school holiday, and will be developing a website on which to record information.

Of the pond dipping, Grace (aged 9) wrote: *"I had a great time pond dipping. It*

*was a nice sunny day and we got there on the tractor trailer and my friends were there. All the ponds had different depths so the dragonflies could breed, and one of them had a really muddy bank next to it. We caught water snails and newts and a frog. We saw a Great Crested newt, which is rare, and looked like a tiny dragon. We put all of the little creatures in jars and looked at them and then let them go. Then we climbed back onto the tractor trailer and I chatted to my friends on the way home. I had a really great day.”*

Did you know that there are now over 1000 wildlife recordings for the village, which is more than 1 per resident? Two hundred of these have been added since the group started. It would be lovely to work towards 2 per resident. We are acutely aware that many common species have not been recorded throughout the parish. It would be lovely if more people could join us, and contribute information about the wildlife they see.

Our next event will be on the 12<sup>th</sup> April, when we will be looking for signs of spring. Look out for more details nearer the time.

## **Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service**

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service are committed to supporting the safety and wellbeing of residents in all of the communities that we serve.

The Safe and Well visit will provide us with sufficient information to support you and, with your permission, refer you to selected partner agencies who will be able to support you further. We will not share your data with marketing companies or for other purposes.

Our visit will last no longer than 60 minutes and is completely FREE of charge.

Our visit will assess five key elements:

- Fire safety in the home – including cooking, general safety and escape plans.
- Falls prevention – including simple remedial action such as replacing lightbulbs or taping down loose carpet.
- Alcohol use – Alcohol related illness in the over 65s is on the increase. We can provide you with helpful information.
- Stay well and warm – Can you afford to heat your home? Do you have access to a hot meal? Do you have access to all the services available to you?
- Crime reduction – We can provide advice on making your home more secure in addition to advice to make you less vulnerable to scams or fraud.
- You are under no obligation to answer any questions that you do not want to, but the more information you provide us with, the better we will be able to support you. We can also provide advice in relation to promoting the health and safety of individuals with hoarding concerns, as well as providing valuable information to care providers.

During March, we will also be raising awareness of the fire risks associated with smoking, with national No Smoking Day on the 8<sup>th</sup>.

We often find smoking is one of many factors making someone more at risk of fire, for example, when combined with poor mobility, health problems or being elderly, it increases someone's chance of having a fire.

Here are some tips to take on board or give to friends and family that smoke:

- Never leave a lit cigarette or pipe unattended.
- Always use a proper ashtray and make sure the contents are cold before you tip it in the bin.
- Never smoke in bed and avoid smoking in a chair if you are likely to fall asleep.
- Most importantly, fit a working smoke alarm and test it regularly. Don't forget to also test the smoke alarms of those you love. If you have an elderly or vulnerable relative, friend or neighbour, pop by and make sure they have a working smoke alarm. If they don't, that is something we can provide as part of a Safe and Well visit.
