### • Chairman of Barton Parish Council - Margaret Penston

Councillors: Barton has the full complement of nine Parish Councillors. These are John Bailey (JB) (from Dec 2013), Bev Edwards, (BE), Hugh Greenfield (HG), Mary MacDonald (MM), Robin Page (RP) (until Sept 2013), Margaret Penston (MP), Mike Radford (MR), Tim Scott (TS), Nigel Siddall (NS) and Karen Wilkins (KW). During the year RP resigned due to other commitments and JB was co-opted. The next election for Barton Parish Councillors will be in May 2015.

The Parish Clerk is Patrick DeBacker (PDB).

Our County Councillor (Hardwick Division) is Stephen Frost (SF), and our District Councillor (Barton Ward) is Francis Burkitt (FB).

**Meetings:** Meetings continue to be held on the first Tuesday of every month except August. At the May meeting (the Parish Council Annual Meeting) the committee and working group members are decided. In 2013 the following were agreed (Chairs underlined)

Council Chair – MP, Vice-Chair – TS

Planning – MP, MM, MR, TS, BE

Recreation Ground – HG, MP, BE, TS, NS and KW

Leys Project – MP, HG, MM, TS, PDB and John Boocock

Highways – NS, HG, MM, MR

School Parking - MR, MM and John Boocock

Representatives: BRIG – NS; Village Hall representative – KW; Neighbourhood Watch liaison – BE; Barton Energy Group – BE, MM, MR.

Councillor attendance of the 11 full meetings in 2013-14 was JB (4), BE (8), HG (10), MM (8), RP (1), MP (11), MR (6), TS (9), NS (11), KW (6).

The Clerk, PDB, attended all 11 meetings. SF attended 6 and FB attended 5 meetings and both sometimes sent reports when unable to attend.



In August we (normally) do a walkabout around the village as a group. This is useful for highlighting any problems, such as potholes, overhanging trees, problems with notice boards or street signs. In August 2013 our walkabout looked at:

Trees – following concern after a recent court ruling, we noted the number of diseased and dead wood on trees and branches overhanging paths and roads, Builders rubbish (including old double gazed windows, an abandoned skip with an old TV etc) along the Drift between Wallis's and Rayners, Untidy vegetation beside cycleway along A603, Pot holes,

Overgrown hedges, Notice boards needing attention, Parking outside school, some yellow lines needed Some road signs needing attention

#### Issues from the APM 2013:

The following issues were raised at the APM in 2013. Neither has been resolved. The difficulty of crossing at Conker's was highlighted. The red strip is to be reinstated; we should be exploring a zebra crossing and/or 20mph limit.

Confusion at the A603/ New Road junction was noted. (An example was spotted about 2 mins after arriving to take a photograph of the junction)

**'Stumpy'** – What should be done with the stump left when the dead horse chestnut tree was cut down in August 2013? While the contractor was on site a villager suggested that the stump could be carved into something interesting. It was decided to stop the work and allow time for discussion about this. Adrian Koe will lead a discussion on the options later in the meeting.

#### **Planning applications:**

Between January and December 2013, 24 applications from South Cambs planning department were considered. These included 5 for extensions or alterations to exisiting properties and 3 for tree work. Various other applications involved wind turbines, business change of use, location of a mobile home, change to a dropped kerb, an air-source heat pump, relocation of a gas tank and fire safety wall, fire detection in a listed building and various work at Wallis's garage including erection of security fence.



#### The Recreation Ground:

A rota of Councillors empties the bins and clear litter. The new slide installed in Aug 2013 (from Burwash grant) and the rest of the play equipment is increasingly popular with young people.

## The Leys Project:

Increased use of the sports facilities on the Rec (football, bowls, tennis and the playgound) and the new pavilion have highlighted the need to improve the car parking area and the footpath across the Leys. This was a major project for a group of Councillors and John Boocock during the year. Thanks to John who has worked tirelessly on the project, obtaining estimates and liaising with contractors. Thanks To Mary MacDonald who expertly and successfully led the grant application process.

Amey Cespa. Grant of £15,400 received for work on car park

WREN. Grant of £30,800 for work on the path. This will include solar lights, as on parts of the guided busway, where light shines out sideways.

Donations from BRIG and other users, Agricole, South Cambs Community Chest and Cambridgeshire Highways Dept and underwriting up to £3500 from Barton Parish Council. Work started in March 2014 and the heavy work was finished by late April. Grass seed has been planted and areas are roped off to allow this to grow. The aim is for the car parking area to eventually be as green as it has traditionally been.

## The Barton-Grantchester cycleway/bridleway:

Barton's responsibility ends at the pair of black posts but we have been working with Grantchester to improve the surface of the full length of the bridleway. It is well used by commuting cyclists, walkers and some horses. The path has become overgrown and rutted. Barton's plans are complete and work on our section will start soon.

Users' views were sought. (~30 received)

Grantchester wanted a more permanent wide surface than Barton did. We wanted an improved cycleway without losing the rural nature of the path.

Councillors eventually persuaded Peter Gaskin (County Paths Officer) of this and he agreed to provide manpower to cut back vegetation while retaining the central bushes. He has also provided road planings which will be put down along the path (soon).

#### **Barton Energy Group:**

BEG was formed in 2010 and is a member of SPEP (Sustainable Parish Energy Partnership). Activities have included an Energy Survey, Loan of Energy Monitors, Thermal Imaging, Solar Panel promotion, Green Deal Promotion (18 assessments in Barton), Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) Analysis (122 domestic properties)
Recent meeting (3 April) to promote low energy light bulbs (bulk order, end April). Bev Edwards will give a full report later in the meeting.

## **Neighbourhood Watch:**

Bev Edwards is the local co-ordinator.

Barton is generally a low-crime area but every incident can be distressing.

Circulates regular reports and advice.

Recent issue of RSPCA collectors in village. Bev contacted RSPCA and discovered they were genuine but were not behaving appropriately. They would be contacted.

#### **BeaVers (The Barton Volunteers):**

Thanks to John Boocock and his team who keep our village clean and tidy, identifying jobs along footpaths, in Church Close, on the Rec and the Leys, gutter painting on bus shelters, installing and maintaining benches and much more.

Thanks also to Richard Newstead for his regular litter patrol.



#### QTSQ. The Quarter-To-Six Quadrant:

The QTSQ (villages Barton, Coton, Grantchester nd Madingley) is now a MGITA (Major Green Infrastructure Area) "the [local] network of protected sites, nature reserves, greenspaces and greenway linkages. Green Infrastructure should provide (where possible) multi-functional uses, i.e, wildlife, recreational and cultural experience, as well as delivering ecological services, such as flood protection and microclimate control."

New finger-posts have been installed in Grantchester. Over time these finger posts will be copied in other QTSQ villages.

## New Road parking outside School:

This continues to be a problem at the start and end of the school day. School introduced a 'Kiss and Drop' system with mixed success. Some parents missed the meetings with other parents in the playground. Parking has been encouraged at Burwash or the Rec but this has been poorly taken up.

#### Facebook:

'Barton Village Cambs' now has a Community page on Facebook. We have 46 'likes' so far but would like to encourage more villagers to use the page for discussion or for publicity of village events.

#### **Street Lights:**

Most of the street lamps in Barton were replaced with fewer and more efficient lamps in January 2013 but the High Street is only now being done. There is currently a dispute with Balfour Beatty over the proximity of a column very close to one house.

#### **Broadband:**

BT are working in the village.

A BT engineer told me last week that we should be getting 40Mb/s in Barton within 6 weeks! Current best speeds  $\sim\!\!5\text{Mb/s}$ 

(Fingers crossed)

#### The Telephone Box:

What should we do with it? Some villages, including Wimpole have converted it into a 'Red Box Library' managed by volunteers and run on a trust system where borrowers are asked to return borrowed books or to replace them with books of their own.

#### **Emergency Planning:**

A list has been compiled of contacts for emergency situations – not only Fire, Police, Ambulance, but also Cambridgeshire CC, South Cambs DC, Electricity, Water, Floodline, Doctor, Environmental Health, NHS Direct and Parish Council contacts.

Also, Village contacts: Church contacts, Rec Ground, Neighbourhood Watch, local farmers, practical help, car drivers, Village Hall, Playgroup, School, Post Office, Pubs, Conkers

### The Parish Plan:

Of the actions identified, some have been completed, some ongoing, some projected and some abandoned. The plan was updated in July 2013 – see the village website (<a href="www.barton-cambs.org.uk">www.barton-cambs.org.uk</a>). The section headings are:

To improve traffic safety within Barton

To improve safety and accessibility for cyclists in and around Barton

To ensure there are adequate sporting facilities and activities in Barton

To improve information and communication within Barton

## • County Councillor -Stephen Frost, Hardwick Division:

In his first year Stephen has been made welcome in the ten villages he represents; he sits on two important committees and admits that finance and budget are difficult because they require £38 million of cuts. Local issues included potholes, transport infrastructure and street lighting. He joined Councillors on the village walkabout in August. R. Page criticised the installation of ugly, urban street lights in conservation areas.

#### • District Councillor - Francis Burkitt, Barton Ward.



Francis commented that Barton had won the Barrel Race yet again. On more important matters The Local Plan was now being examined for soundness by a government inspector; amendments were to be expected; he felt that Barton Road into Cambridge would remain a vulnerable area, since the Green Belt would be reviewed in 2019. The recent City Deal should help infrastructure. There remained a desperate shortage of council houses; one way forward was for landowners to allocate land purely for homes for those with local connections. The green bin collection would be suspended in winter months. SCDC tries to be efficient with scant resources; it has the 13th lowest council tax of UK districts. It is important in the Quarter to Six Quadrant to remember that "others hear us more,

if we shout together to improve our green area close to Cambridge."

#### Clerk to Barton Parish Council - Patrick De Backer

The accounts for 2012-13 had been audited satisfactorily by both internal and external auditors. The draft accounts for 2013-14 were now available for inspection, showing a breakdown of expenditure £27,571 and income £27,894, and reserves earmarked for specific projects. The Council was back down to more normal levels of spending. The new focus had been the Leys Project, as well as the improvements to the bridle way to Grantchester. Payment had been made for speed reduction. The precept for 2014-15 has been raised to £18,000 or £47.91 per band D household because SCDC will no longer allocate a supplementary grant to compensate for welfare changes. However, Barton remains a prudent council with a low level of precept compared with neighbouring villages.

## PCSO Alex Giltinane reported on Police matters:

Alex introduced himself and said he tried to visit the village regularly; this was an opportunity to recognise and meet local people. Ongoing problems included Nottingham knockers, fake readers of solar panel meters and parking on pavements. He encouraged the use of 101 or 999 and asked for volunteers for Speedwatch (2 immediately came forward).

## What would you like done with "Stumpy" at Conkers?

Adrian Koe outlined proposals for a carved owl. A survey had brought 80% of responses in favour and pledges of £1050 against a projected cost of around £750. The Parish Council had wanted the Annual Parish Meeting to express its opinion. A lively debate ensued with firm views expressed on both sides. Opponents said a carving would be a discordant impediment in a treasured village, it could rot quickly and be an unfortunate distraction; it would be better to have a new tree (nearby saplings are growing already). Others were keen to promote sensitive and compact public art at no cost to the Council. The meeting voted to ask for a comprehensive survey of the village on this issue.

## Matters raised by Parishioners at the Annual Meeting 2014:

- a. A parishioner wanted to ensure that the Parish Council was using ethical employment practices and that it did not have employees on zero contracts. The Clerk responded that all contractors followed appropriate regulations.
- **b**. It was pointed out that the new street signs at Allens Close and Mailes Close were not especially helpful.
- c. Several residents were interested in creating a small library at the phone box in the High Street which may be redundant. The Clerk is to investigate.
- **d**. It was noted that the Emergency Plan needs annual revision.

We attract children not only from our own catchment villages of Barton and Grantchester but from many of the surrounding villages and Cambridge city, who choose to come to us because we are a small village church school. At the last count, we had pupils from 12 areas outside our catchment.


After almost 12 years as Head Teacher, Miss Carpenter tendered her resignation just before Christmas and the governors started the process of making a new appointment. We are delighted to be able to announce that Mrs Claire Coulson will take over the headship of the school from September 2014 and look forward to her leading us through the next phase of Barton School's development.


We also saw Mrs Diane Floate leave us after 34 years dedicated service as Cleaner-in-Charge. Mrs Floate has not only looked after the school premises brilliantly for this time, but she has also been a wonderful support to all the staff, governors and pupils who have

attended the school during her time there. With her cheery smile and nothing-is-too-much attitude, she has cared for us all in a way that is far beyond any job description and she will be greatly missed.

This year we appointed two new parent governors and we look forward to developing their impact on the school and the children's education.

The children were commended on their behaviour and performance and the attendance of a group of such young people at such a poignant event was recognised and appreciated. # Reports from Barton Village Institutions and Groups\*:

## • Barton Energy Group Bev Edwards

My last report on Barton Energy Group's activities to an Annual Parish Meeting was in April 2012.

Since then, we have held 3 well-attended meetings in Barton, with the aim of helping Barton villagers to make their homes more energy-efficient, and therefore save money.

The first of these was on 28<sup>th</sup> January 2013. This was the day that the Green Deal was launched. Speakers from the District Council and two suppliers talked about the Green Deal and other government initiatives that provide funding for home energy improvements. There was also a short talk about a proposed Community Wind Turbine for Barton, but this will not be going ahead as it would cause interference to the local radio telescopes.

The second was held on 4th December 2013. This was under the auspices of the Sustainable Parishes Energy Partnership, run by the District Council. This introduced the Cambridgeshire Action On Energy initiative, which is still under development and should be publicly announced shortly. We also presented an analysis that BEG has done of all the Energy Performance Certificates that have been produced for Barton houses, about a third of all Barton's housing stock. As may be expected in a village that has very few new houses, Barton's houses are on average less energy efficient than the

country average. This is why BEG will continue to keep up to date with various government schemes that are aimed at improving energy efficiency at a reasonable cost, and to publicise these.

A third meeting was held on 3rd April 2014 and was mainly aimed at launching a scheme to provide high-quality low-energy light bulbs at a discount. The local company - My Green Lighting - chosen by the District Council, will be supplying the light bulbs and is very knowledgeable. It is also willing to provide advice to reduce the complexity of choosing from a very wide range of available bulbs that use different technologies and have different shapes, sizes, colours and fittings. Orders are now being taken and the first ones will be delivered in mid May.

## Bowls Club Hugh Greenfield

In 2012 I reported that we had just had our first season using the New Pavilion completed in the summer of 2011. The Bowls Club has benefited from the better facilities by holding social activities such as lunches and teas during the Autumn and Winter Seasons.

We are also pleased that the new Car Park has been achieved. The wet weather during the last 6 months has meant that no one could park on the Recreation Ground during that period.

The Bowls Club has approximately 25 Members with Membership costing £40 per year. It is a well managed club with an active Committee which meets regularly. We are self supporting. Our main expenses are Insurance, Maintenance of the Green and our equipment. We play leagues both afternoon and evenings.

It was hoped that we would share Club Nights with our friends of the Tennis Club, but in the event that did not happen

We hope that the Car Park and the environs of the Pavilion will have sufficient lighting, so that when Events finish people can get to their cars safely.

#### Burwash Manor Mike Radford

This is an organic farm growing wheat with stocks of cattle, pigs and alpaca; it is committed to conservation and wildlife work, for instance great crested newts, dragonflies and barn owls have been in evidence. There is a network of interconnecting paths available to walkers. Varied events, including the Summer Ball and Apple Day, have contributed £13, 500 to charity. The curved slide on the Recreation Ground was bought this way. The new Food Hall has been a success, while a third courtyard has been approved and will be built next year.

## • Christian Fellowship Sheila Boocock

The Christian Fellowship meets on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday of the month usually in the Village Hall. In two of the



'summer' months we meet for afternoon tea in members gardens. This acts as an incentive to having a good tidy up of the garden if you are the host! We try to have a varied programme with speakers telling us of charities working in this country and overseas such as The Leprosy Mission, Mercy Ships and the Cambridge Food Bank and the St Peters Organ Repair Fund. We have been able to give away a total of £392.70

Members are encouraged to collect in a jar or small bag their small change i.e. 1p, 2p and 5p coins which are weighing down their pockets or purses and bring them along as well to give to the Overseas Disability Charity. Non members also contribute in this way and hand in their collection once their bag is filled. We are looking for more people to do this. 'Every little helps'.

It is an informal meeting of about 15 - 18 people from very different Church backgrounds but there is no need to have any church background. We all drink the same type of tea!

## Countryside Restoration Trust Robin Page

This has been a busy 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary year – CRT has increased from the original 10 to 450 acres and gained in members. At the celebration at the Royal Geographical Society in London Prince Charles spoke on video. Tim Scott has proved an invaluable tenant farmer at Lark Rise Farm where there is an improving population of harvest mice and water voles. The menaces of Himalayan balsam and mink have been attacked. However, some hooligan dog walkers create problems for grey partridge. Efforts have been made to bring back hedgehogs to the centre of the village, as well as to introduce red squirrels on to Tresco. Numerous schools, groups and individuals have visited; indeed the organisation has received lots of encouragement from everywhere.
